Rwanda is a beautiful landlocked country located in **East Africa**, bordered by **Uganda** to the north, **Burundi** to the south, **Tanzania** to the east, and the **Democratic Republic of the Congo** to the west. Known for its breathtaking landscapes, Rwanda is home to **five volcanoes**, numerous **lakes**, and **rivers** that feed into Africa's great waterways.

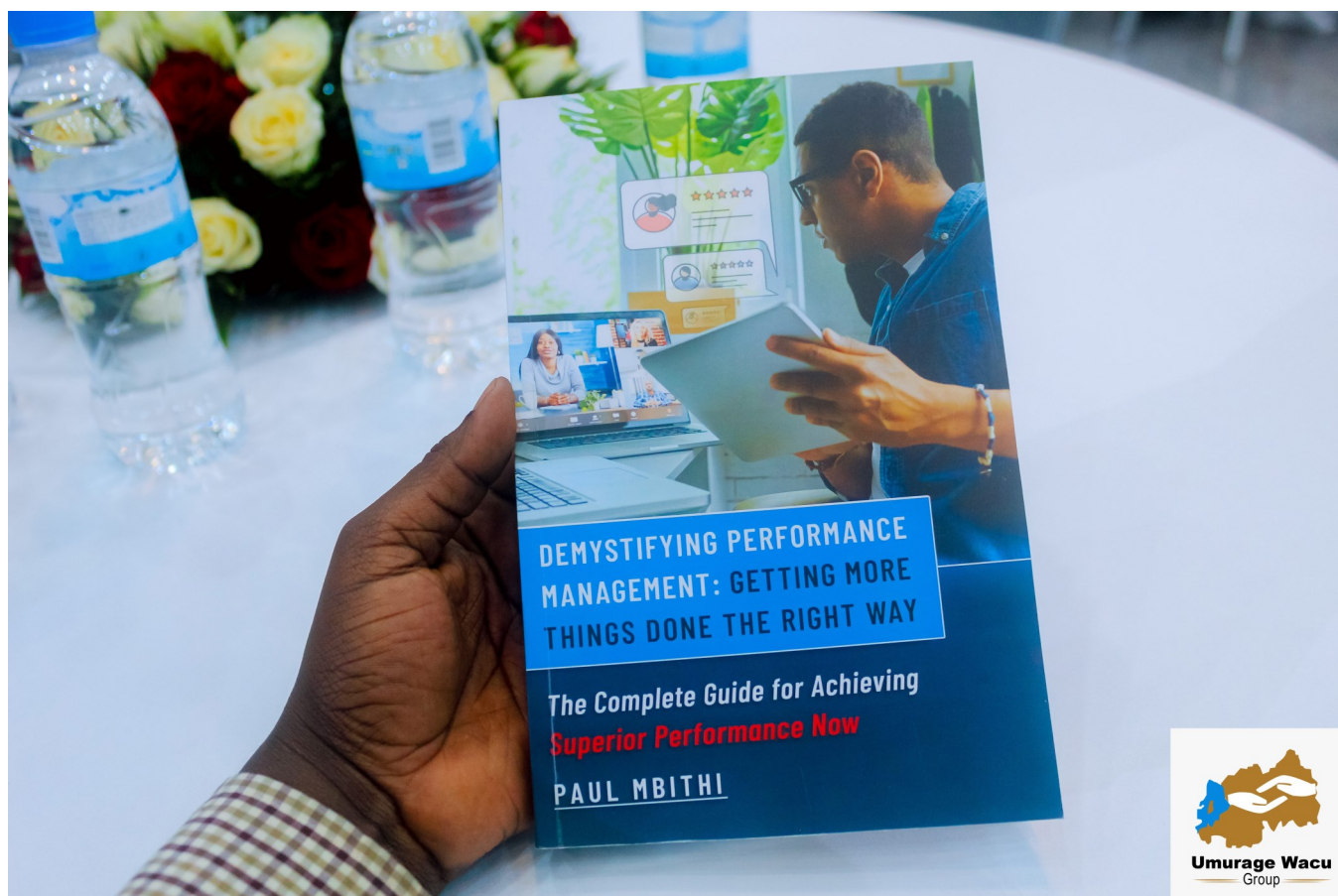
Book Launch: Demystifying Performance Management

#Umuganura 2025

Umuganura 2025 Rwanda's Harvest Festival

Umuganura, the traditional harvest ceremony in Rwanda, was celebrated on Friday, August 1, 2025, as a public holiday. The celebration took place in every village across the country, bringing communities together to give thanks for the harvest and to share joy and unity.

At the national level, the main celebration was held in Musanze, where senior government officials, including the Minister of Local Government, were in attendance.

It was a wonderful experience to celebrate Umuganura at the national level, enjoy the various cultural activities, and capture memorable photos.

The event was organized by Inteko y'Umucu (Rwanda Heritage Academy).



On 31st July 2025,

I was part of the journalists' team assigned to cover Umuganura celebrations.

As a photojournalist, travel writer, and photographer of tourism attractions and cultural heritage, it was an honor to document this important national event that celebrates Rwanda's traditions and unity.

Two historical sites were visited





Gakenke:

Huro; A bush where the rain-making shrine.

A historical site built in the 16th century by Minyaruko ya Nyamikenke, King of Busigi at the request of King Ruganzu II Ndoli.

The Abiru used this shrine

to interpret rainfall patterns. **(Source Inteko y'umuco).**

Now, it is located in Muhondo Sector, Gakenke District, North Province.

Rulindo: Rwiri-Nturo; Birthplace of the royal drum Karinga.



The drums creations was overseen by Minyaruko ya Nyamikenke, a prominent rain-maker and chief of Busigi, He sent his son, Nyamigezi to Rwiri-Nturo, a dense forest known for its exceptional imyugo hardwood trees.

From a single tree

of great quality, five wooden segments were carved. Three of the lower segments were chosen by royal ritualists (abiru) to craft identical drums. Each drum was named; Bariba (bottom) Karinga (middle) and Karihejuru (upper).

Karinga was middle and selected to serve as Ingabe, the royal drum and symbol of kingship and was formally dedicated to king Ruganzu II Ndori **(Source Inteko y'Umuco).**

Now it is in Rwiri Village, Cyungo sector, Rulindo District, North Province.

Musanze, celebration of Umuganura at Ubworoherane Stadium in Musanze

The celebration of **Umuganura** (Rwanda's Harvest Ceremony) was truly amazing and well organized by **Inteko y'Umuco (Rwanda Heritage Academy)**. The **Minister of Local Government, Mr. Dominique Habimana**, officially represented the **Government of Rwanda** at the event.

Exhibition: Made in Musanze

During **Umuganura Day**, local **businesses and industries** from **Musanze** showcased their activities and products in the **"Made in Musanze" exhibition**. The event highlighted the district's achievements and celebrated the progress Rwanda is making across various sectors of development.



Carnival of Harvest

The Carnival of Harvest featured a rich display of agricultural products such as beans, potatoes, sorghum, and other local crops. This tradition holds deep cultural significance in Rwandan heritage, symbolizing gratitude for the harvest and hope for the future. During the ceremony, these crops are often used by the Minister to present seeds for the next agricultural season, representing renewal and continued growth.

Itorero Urukerereza (National Ballet Urukerereza)

The **National Ballet Urukerereza** performed to entertain visitors during the celebrations. The dancers, known as **Intore**, showcased their impressive skills and traditional **amacumu** (spears), demonstrating precision, strength, and the beauty of Rwandan cultural heritage.



Assumption weekend (Kibeho and Huye)



Nathalie Mukamazimpaka is one of the women who experienced apparitions of the Virgin Mary and she still lives in Kibeho.

She was recently interviewed on Pacis TV, sharing her experiences and reflection on the day.

On 15th August 2025, Assumption Day, Rwandans and visitors from around the world made a pilgrimage to Kibeho (Our Lady Of Kibeho Shrine,) a holy site in Rwanda. Kibeho is known internationally as a holy place because of the reported apparitions of the Virgin Mary to young Rwandan women between 1981-1989.

Since then, pilgrims from across the globe have visited Kibeho, making it one of Rwanda's most important destinations for religious tourism. Kibeho is located in Nyaruguru District, in the Southern Province of Rwanda.

4 Things to Do in Kibeho:

1. **Fetch water from the Virgin Mary's Spring** a sacred site believed to have spiritual significance.
2. **Pray at the Apparition Site** ; spend time reflecting and offering your prayers where the Virgin Mary appeared.
3. **Visit the Chapel of Apparitions** ; bring your wishes and prayers to this holy chapel.
4. **Pray at the Chapel of Jesus Christ** ; a place for meditation, adoration and spiritual connection.
And don't forget to visit The Divine Mercy Statue (Nyarushishi).

Discovering Mount Huye – Huye, Rwanda

On Sunday, 17th August 2025, I hiked Mount Huye (Kwa Nyagakecuru), which rises to 2,700 meters. The hike offered stunning hills and a glimpse into the rich history of the region, making it an unforgettable experience for nature and culture enthusiasts.

One of the highlights of the hike was visiting the coffee plantations, where I learned about the entire coffee production process from seed to fruit. This hands-on experience provided a deeper appreciation of Rwanda's agricultural heritage and the role coffee plays in the local economy and culture.

Rwandan Village



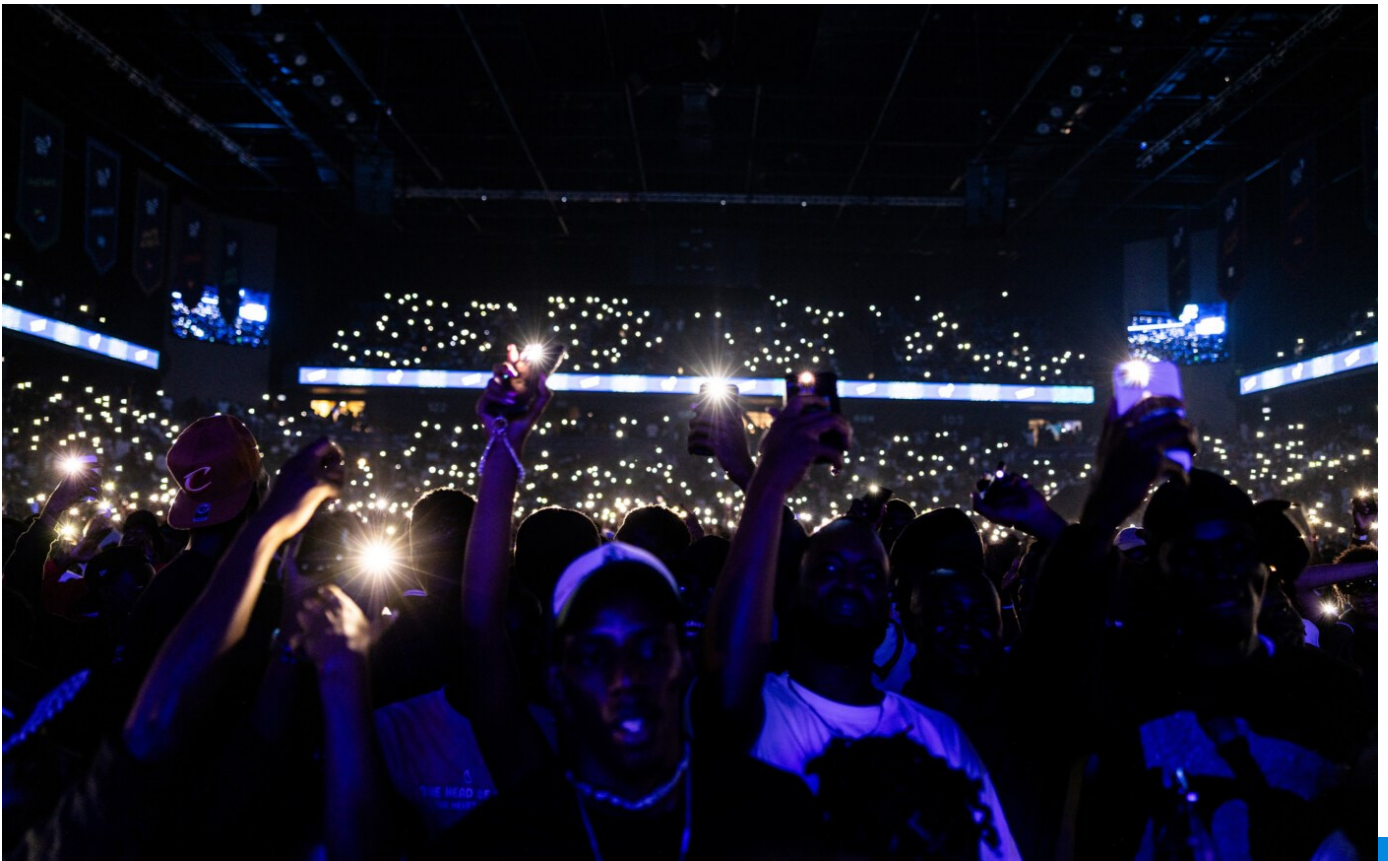
Rwanda has beautiful villages, and taking time to travel from the city to the countryside is a wonderful way to change your environment and experience rural life.

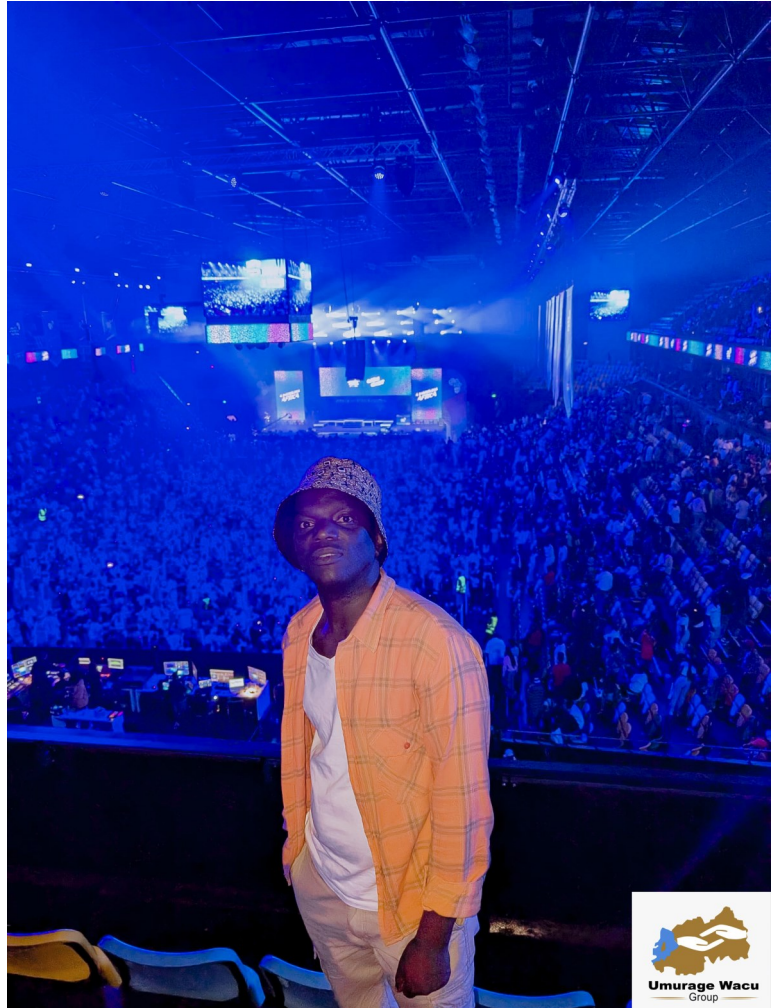
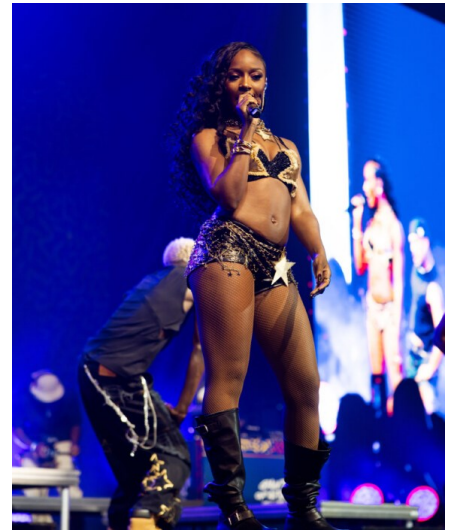
Giants Of Africa Festival (A borderless Africa) #3Edition

The event was not only a celebration of World Cycling and Rwanda Sports but also highlighted the growing sport tourism industry on the continent.

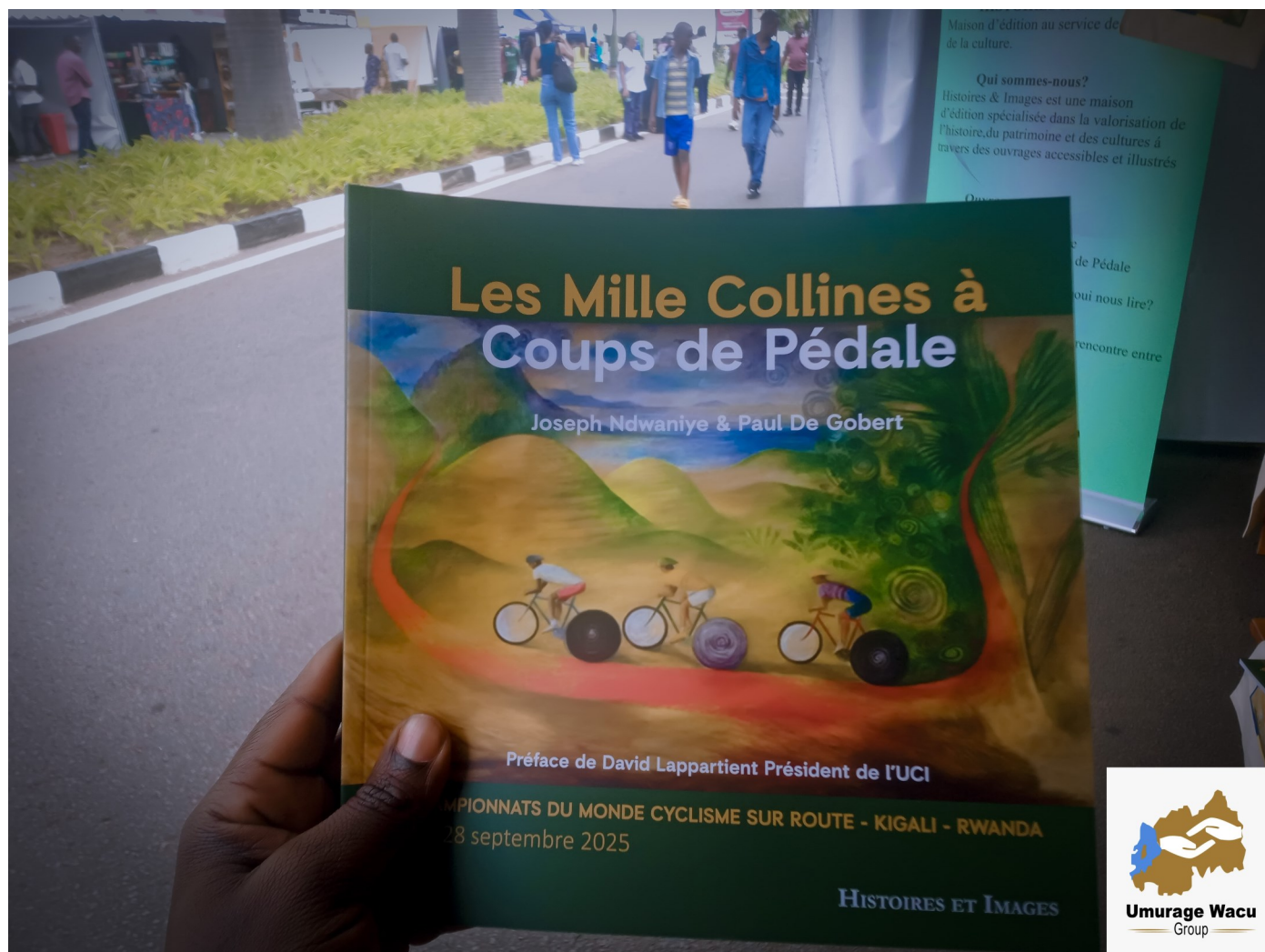

Igicumbi Magazine is now published both online and in print, starting from January 2025.

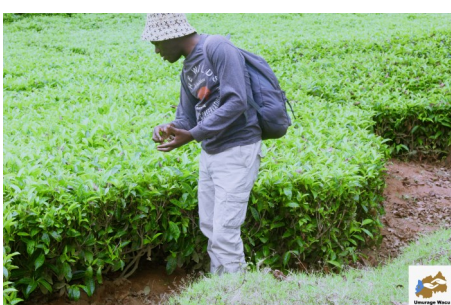
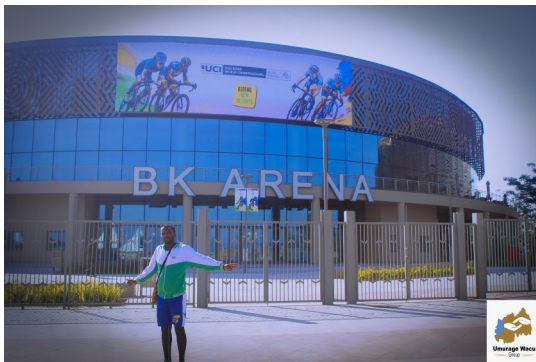
